A note from the Chair of Swim England West Midlands

Sometimes the year after a major games, like the Commonwealth Games, can be a little demotivating. However, this for our Aquatics community was just the opposite. Moving our regional Championships into the Sandwell Aquatics Centre and seeing the Diving programme finally come to fruition was a marvellous achievement for the hard work and planning undertaken in the previous four years.

We started investing in Diving as soon as the Games were announced and in partnership with Swim England appointed Sarah Barrow as the first regional Diving Officer. The plan was clear; train the workforce in a range of satellite centres building to the opening of the Sandwell Aquatics Centre. As part of the Sport England legacy investment, the Coach and Development Officer have been funded to get the programme running and the partnership with Sandwell Leisure Trust and the Council itself is seeing some very promising initial results.

In addition, Amanda Swan and her team have worked with the amalgamated Sandwell Aquatics club to develop a full pathway for lane swimming and water polo. Again, supported by the Council, we are already seeing some very local people emerging into County and Regional competition.

I chaired the Legacy Governance group made up of partners including Active Black Country, Association for Physical Education, the Black Swimming Association, Sandwell MBC and Swim England nationally. The four strands of Workforce, Children and Young People, Community Development and the broader Aquatics community have progressed, and still considerable work is needed particularly with the workforce to progress addressing the significant inequalities within Birmingham and the Black Country. Having said that partnership working is the only way we can grow the sport, and this will give us some clear learning for the future.

The legacy project, the major research undertaken through the Club Culture project and considerable consultation has enabled us to develop a clear strategy for the future. Amanda has now put in place a new staffing structure that focuses on the key objectives, and we are certainly more focused on the needs of the club community following this consultation and particularly the views expressed by clubs abouts how Swim Mark is or isn't working for you.

A common strand emerging from the consultation was the need to listen more and I hope you have seen a greater emphasis on this. This has further solidified our strong commitment to safeguarding of our participants and practices of the past that are now unacceptable must eradicated from our sport. However, we do recognise that coaches and club committees need further training and support to enable this to be culturally embedded.

Thank you to Amanda Swan and her team of Sian James and Grace Grove (who sadly left us at the end of the year) and our two new appointments of Ffion Edgeley and Laura Hood are already focused on supporting the clubs more directly.

Thanks also to the board of Directors who have grappled with some very difficult issues but have always made sensible decisions in the best interests of the swimmers.

I am looking forward to the new year and our four strategies for the growth of the region and I hope you can also be part of the journey with us.

Legacy Working Group

Commonwealth Games legacy working group

As part of the Commonwealth Games Sport England funded Governing bodies to develop sustainable legacy programmes from the stimulation of the games Swim England were granted £500,000 based on four areas in the Inspire 2022 project:

- · Children and young people focused on school swimming.
- Workforce development to increase the number of local workforces in teaching and coaching.
- Community development seeking to engage those least likely to engage in aquatics activity
- Progression of the Diving programme.

A governance group was formed to oversee the project and extend the Board to cover all disciplines of Aquatics. The group Chaired by Simon Kirkland has membership from Active Black Country, Sport Birmingham, the Black Swimming Association, the Association for Physical Education (AfPE), Sandwell MBC, Sport England and Swim England.

The partnership has taken time to develop and agree ways of working and priorities. However, some strong outcomes were achieved. These included a series of Breakfast clubs, Pop-up pool pilot, a recruitment academy for those from the local area, the appointment for diving staff to initiate the programme at SAC and some resources to test and learn with club and coach activity.

In most cases it is too early to see clear impact, however new teachers and coaches have been identified and the community programme is starting to see some of the challenges faced by the local community in engaging in aquatics activity. This programme will be ongoing for the next year at least and we encourage clubs to engage to explore how to engage those from communities that don't normally engage in club activity.

Clubs

Club Development, 2023 has been an encouraging year for clubs, with membership beginning to strengthen after the past challenges of Covid disruption.

We have continued to work closely with our clubs, to ensure that they all meet the minimum standards required for Swim England affiliated clubs, as well as supporting clubs to achieve SwimMark accreditation, for good governance and best practice.

Good governance has been an emphasis and focus for the Region over the past year and have maintained our very high standard of clubs.

The Region in 2023 has continued to offer a range of club development and membership grants together with educational bursaries, talented athlete bursaries and support to officials training. I am pleased to see that our clubs have accessed many of these grants to develop their club, volunteers, and supporting coaching teams.

I would like to take the opportunity to sincerely thank Amanda and her team, for their outstanding hard work supporting our clubs during the past year.

Club Development Grants

Club Development Grants were available to assist clubs within the Swim England West Midland Region to improve or maintain SwimMark development plans. During the year the Club Development Committee approved 12 Club Development Grants to the value of £16,402.

Club Membership Growth Grants

Club Membership Growth Grants were available to clubs within Swim England West Midland Region to assist in the delivery of a project to increase club membership numbers across all categories. During the year the Club Development Committee approved 6 Club Membership Growth Grants to the value of £5,226.

Talented Athlete Bursaries

Talented Athlete Bursaries were available to athletes selected to be part of England Talent teams from a club (all disciplines). During the year the Region approved 6 Talented Athlete Bursaries to the value of £1,484.



Diving



After a year of rapid growth in 2022, this year has been about consolidating the diving activity going on in the Region with the main focus of the project being centred around the opening of the Sandwell Aquatics Centre and the commencement of the diving programme there.

The three feeder sites of Wyndley Leisure Centre, Tudor Grange Leisure Centre and Walsall Gala Baths continue to operate well with good numbers on their programme and coaching teams gaining confidence, providing a great introduction to the sport. There is also now a really good pathway in place with many divers beginning their diving at one of our three feeder sites, and then once they reach a certain level transferring across to Sandwell to continue their journey. This hasn't been to the detriment of the feeder site, with all programmes either maintaining or even growing in numbers throughout the year, which has been great to see.

The highlight of the year for the diving project was undoubtedly the opening of the Sandwell Aquatics Centre in July, with the diving programme wasting no time on getting started with holiday and taster programmes being delivered throughout the summer holidays, and then the lessons programme formally beginning in September. The programme at Sandwell is now well established, with fantastic numbers on their lessons programme, and a good squad structure in place following the delivery of two Talent ID programmes in local schools.

Towards the back end of the year some of the divers from the programme attended the Santa Skills competition in Sheffield, and although they weren't able to represent the Sandwell club they were able to travel as a team and compete together under a temporary membership.

The final achievement of the year (although technically this sneaked into 2024) was the affiliation of Sandwell Diving Club to Swim England West Midlands Region, and the creation of the Region's first ever diving club!

Key Achievements

- ·Successful delivery of 4 x Inspired to Try: Diving sessions across all sites in the West Midlands which exposed just under 150 children to diving for the first time
- ·5 new diving assistant coaches qualified
- ·Just under 1000 children took part in tasters and holiday programmes at Sandwell over the summer
- ·Since opening on the 11th September, the dive programme at Sandwell has grown to over 250 participants, including 154 in Learn to Dive, and 82 squad members
- ·Two of the coaches from feeder sites are now regularly also coaching at Sandwell Aquatics Centre
- ·Sandwell delivered a successful Talent ID programme in schools, seeing over 800 children, and with 60 being recruited into the programme

Looking ahead to 2024:

Complete Affiliation to Swim England

Now Sandwell Diving Club is official affiliated to the West Midlands Region, they now need to complete the remaining elements of affiliation to Swim England. This is due to be completed by April, and once complete there will be a big PR piece done on the official formation and launch of the club to shout about the success and addition of the sport to the region.

Major Events Coming to Sandwell

A number of national diving events are due to be held at Sandwell in 2024 – with the British Diving Championships coming to the centre in May, and the Swim England Diving National Age Groups being hosted at Sandwell in June. This provides an exciting opportunity to showcase the sport and the facility, and drive the growth of the sport and workforce.

Inspired to Try: Diving

Linked to both of the above events, a programme of taster sessions will be delivered in the lead up to each, at Sandwell and also the feeder sites, to capitalise on the increased prominence of diving. The tasters will be an opportunity to grow not just participants, but also recruit additional workforce to the sport in the region. The focus of the activity will be around new audiences and have a strong inclusion agenda to reach out to our non-traditional audiences.

Masters

We had a much better year in 2023 for master's swimmers. British Swimming and Swim England held their National events, BS Champs were at Ponds Forge, Sheffield on 2/3/4th June, and SE Champs were at Ponds Forge, Sheffield on 27/28/29th October. We were well represented at these events by many of our Masters Swimmers.

The organisation of West Midland Masters event is now done by the Regions Event Team. We held the 2023 SE West Midland Masters Champs at The Alan Higgs Centre, Coventry on Saturday 30th September. We had a good very good turnout of Masters, from not just the West Midlands but from other areas of the country. Although this event was successful, we have since been asked to bring forward this event to earlier in the year. Therefore, we have taken this on board and for 2024 it will be taking place on 30th of March 2024 at The Alan Higgs Centre, Coventry.

One of the highlights of the year is the Inter- County Masters Championships which in 2023 took place on Sunday 12th November at the new pool in Derby. This venue was used as we joined with the counties in the East Midlands, to try to make it a more competitive and exciting event. Shropshire, Staffordshire, Warwickshire, and Worcester County all took part with Derbyshire, Leicestershire, Northamptonshire, Nottinghamshire. The venue in Derby is a 10 lane 50m pool and was able to cater to the 8 teams that took part. Much better atmosphere all round, and the results from this event go to National masters to be added to all the other regions doing the same event on or near our date. This is a yearly event and will take place again in 2024 in November.

We are looking forward to 2024 and the County Champs, Regional Champs and Inter-county champs for masters. Dates will be put on the Website as soon as we have confirmation

This last year we have seen several Para events taking place. One of the highlights of the year was the World Para Swimming World Championships which took place in Manchester in July/August. We had the best of the best from around the world. Many swimmers from GB took part some of which were from the West Midland Region. In particular Rebecca Redfern came away with GOLD in the 100m Breaststroke SB13 event.Well Done Rebecca. We had some training sessions during the year cumulating in our own Regional Championships on 15th October 2023. This event also included a Para CPD for Officials and was very well attended. The officials were able to put into practice what they had learned in the classroom.It is hoped that this CPD will be repeated later in 2024.

One other highlight of the year was the World School Games held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. One of our Regions Para swimmers was selected to go and came back with 2 Gold and 1 Silver medals and was named the Top Male Para Swimmer. Well Done Akaash Das from Oswestry Otters. Two other swimmers from Oswestry Otters, Lizzie Allan and Holly Sullivan attended the British Down Syndrome Championships. They both went on to represent GB at the World Down Syndrome Swimming Champs in Antalya, Turkey. Well Done Lizzie and Holly. Early February 2024 saw the Citi Para Swimming World Series take place in Aberdeen, where a number of WMR swimmers took part.

The girls absolutely smashed the first day with a nice win over South West Sharks (7-5), a tight draw against South East (8-8) and finishing the day with a comfortable win over North East Steelers (9-6). Staying on to watch the outcome of the South West Sharks and South East match the girls were overjoyed to see South West win meaning West Midlands top the table.

Sunday saw West Midlands in the second semi-final against London Sharks. From a far stronger group London definitely had a number of strong players making it difficult for West Midlands to defend everyone. The girls put up a strong fight but, in the end, had to admit defeat, final score 6-11 to London Sharks.

The bronze medal match saw West Midlands Warriors face South West Sharks again. An even first half meant lots of exciting polo for all to watch, the atmosphere was electric but a terrible third period for West Mids meant South West pulled ahead. The girls fought back but the last shot in the final seconds was saved by the South West goalie meaning they had lost by 1, final score 9-10 to South West Sharks.

Although the girls did not receive medals, they should be extremely proud of themselves. From the Regions point of view there were many firsts obtained this weekend. First time a West Midlands girls' team has topped a table. The first time a girls U14's team will proceed into U16's in Division 1.

Special mention to Imogen Blassberg who was not only the regions MVP but was also the tournament's top goal scorer with an amazing 35 goals.

The Region has invested in the girls' section over the last 12 months with the new monthly 2-hour sessions for only/RTC girls development. The results from this weekend hopefully prove this format of reinforcing water polo fundamentals at a Regional level is a winning formula. Licenced Open Meets

This year we seem to have recovered licensed competition within this Region since the Covid impact. However, we still need to recover the number of officials in this Region and events are still being cancelled due to official availability and low swimmer attendance. There is a consequential strain on our remaining licensed officials. Some multi-club events are being licensed at level 4 because of the availability of licensed officials. To address these issues that leave swimmers without qualifying events the Regional board have made the following regional rules to licensed events.

·Level 1, 2 & 3 licensed meets on
the same day have a 25-mile radius
between them.

·Lead Referee and Starter to be identified at the time of license application.





Swim England Hall of Fame

Three individuals from the Region have become the latest inductees into the Swim England Hall of Fame after their careers have left an outstanding impact on aquatics.

Rebecca Adlington, Mike Beard and Ellie Simmonds were amongst a total a seven individuals inducted at Swim England's National Awards ceremony held at the University of Birmingham's Great Hall.

The Hall of Fame was set up in 2019 to mark Swim England's 150th anniversary and included 26 people in it's initial induction.

Rebecca Adlington

Record-breaking Rebecca Adlington is Britain's most successful female Olympian of all time in the pool having won a total of four individual medals at the Beijing 2008 and London 2012 Games. Adlington won a total of 17 major championship medals during her glittering career, including four at the 2010 Delhi Commonwealth Games representing England before she retired from competitive swimming at the age of 23.

In 2008, she was named as the Sports Journalists' Association Sportswoman of the Year and placed third in the Sports Personality of the Year Award.

Adlington was appointed OBE in the 2009 New Year Honours list for services to sport.

Mike Beard

Dedicated volunteer Mike Beard has played key roles in both swimming and water polo at Stourbridge and Solihull swimming clubs.

He has been a player, coach and an official – as well as holding key positions on the committee, including publicity officer, treasurer and chair.

Mike was voted onto the Midlands committee and became treasurer in 1977 – a position he still currently holds for the West Midlands region.

In 1989, he was named the Midlands District President and became the ASA President in 2000. Mike has been a trustee for the national governing body since 1984 and in 2009, he received the Harold Fern Award.

He was also awarded the BEM for his services to swimming in 2016.

Ellie Simmonds

Five-time Paralympic champion Ellie Simmonds came to national attention when she competed in the 2008 Beijing Games at the age of 13.

She won the first of her eight Paralympic medals in China, where she was the youngest British athlete, topping the podium in both the S6 100m and 400m Freestyle races.

Further success followed at the London 2012 and Rio 2016 Games before Simmonds called time on her competitive career following the Tokyo 2020 Paralympics.

In addition to her Paralympic glory, Simmonds also won 21 gold medals at World and European Championships and picked up 10 other podium places – and was appointed an OBE in the 2013 New Year Honours list for services to Paralympic sport.

Counties

Staffordshire ASA

At the A.G.M. in 2022 Tony Ward was elected as President of the Association for 2023.

Tony has attended a number of County events as his schedule allows, as a Para- Swimming Official he is in demand for a number of National and International Swimming Competitions.

Once again, Staffordshire's swimming teams competed in two inter-county competitions during the year. The Three Counties Gala between Staffordshire, Worcestershire and Gloucestershire in July was hosted by Gloucester at Wolverhampton in July. Each county fields two teams. This year Staffordshire finished in 2nd place. Next year's event will be hosted by Staffordshire, again at Wolverhampton on the 7th July.

The Swim England National County Team Championships were held in Sheffield in October. 24 swimmers from Staffordshire took part in the event and 4 team officials to support. This year we finished 5th in division 2 of the event and just missed out on promotion.

Staffordshire ASA were delighted that we were able to hold our County Championships under normal conditions for 2023. The weekends of the Championships, Relays and Skins at Stafford Leisure Centre were completed with their usual display of excellent swimming with a huge entry once again. The Relay & Skins Event provided the usual excitement and a good atmosphere amongst the clubs and their rivals. For 2024 we have a new venue having outgrown Stafford due to the numbers and spectator accommodation. After a great deal of hard work and persistence we have managed to secure the 50m commonwealth pool at Solihull for its first full season of opening. We are looking forward to a challenging and exciting event starting in January. Distance events with will remain at Stafford for 2024.

With new members supporting the team we have been able to move forward with a new Constitution, Risk assessments and a Team to support the Recording of event. The Association have also separated the roles of President and Chair. Tony Ward will be Staffordshire's first formal Chair with a tenure of 3 years.

The Staffordshire County Masters and open meet continues to remain extremely popular amongst the Masters swimmers from a wide variety of clubs throughout the country.

We had one Staffordshire Master, Kath Tunnicliffe BCnP, who travelled to the Masters Worlds in Japan not only competing but medalling in many events.

Kath was also a member of mixed medley relay gold team with a new British record.

The end of October saw Master's short course Nationals ,Sheffield where we saw Matt Evans Walsall Swimming club win 4 individual golds, Kath Tunnicliffe winning 4individual golds and Lindsey Gowland 1x gold.

This year was a disappointing turn out for Staffordshire swimmers in open water events. At the Midland open water event there were only 2 clubs competing from Staffordshire: Biddulph SC and Bilston SC.

Unfortunately there are no clubs within Staffordshire playing competitive water polo games.

Geoffrey Kirkham from the Biddulph and Stafford Apex clubs is the only Swim England qualified water polo referee who has been officiating at Water Polo games at a variety of levels throughout 2023.

The Walsall Gala pool continues to be used by the West Midland Region on most Friday nights for young players who have been selected to play water polo games for the West Midland Region. The pool has been used regularly at week-ends for competitions at various levels throughout the year.

SA number of Staffordshire resident water polo swimmers have however been selected to compete for the West Midlands Region.

Walsall Artistic Swimming Club faced a lot of changes throughout the year and the club have managed to recruit new volunteers to keep the club going.

In the National age groups the club took one free team in the 13-15 age group. They swam well with just 5 swimmers in the team some of whom were competing at that level for the first time.

At National Championships (23-24/4) the club had a free and tech team. Both improved on last year finishing 7th for free team with a score of 61.6000 and 5th for tech team with a score of 62.1839. The club had one free duet and 1 tech solo all swimming for the first time at this competition. Robyn Swatman (Great Britain) also competed for Walsall. Robyn won gold for her tech solo and won the Colin Lushington Memorial Trophy for the 3rd year in a row.

The club had 3 athletes selected and attending trainings with the Regional squad during 2023.

Robyn Swatman continues to represent Walsall Artistic Swimming club at the highest level, training with the World Class Program in Bristol alongside her university studies.

Referee training for 2022 was very successful with Kate Caddick and Bev Doughty becoming new additions to our referee pool in early 2023. Two Staffordshire officials applied for the 2023 training program and took their exam in November.

Staffordshire ASA President for 2024 will be Bill Moreton, who has represented Artistic Swimming in Staffordshire for some time and our President-Elect will be Caroline Jones.

We had a very successful Inter-County Masters championships at Derby on 12th November 2023, and the very small Shropshire

In line with Swim England Development Swimming Pathway, Shropshire ASA ran a County Development Programme. Lead Coach was Gethin Bevan and Program Lead Emma Scott Gemmill.

This year there were 2 Development days, both being run at Thomas Telford School, Telford.

The idea of the sessions are to develop swimmers skill levels not to race or work on endurance. This was achieved by appointing

skills coaches from a variety of Clubs within the region. The Development camps are designed not only to support the swimmers but also develop coaches.

For the first session we had coaches from Oswestry, Shrewsbury, Newport and Wellington with a variety of experiences and

knowledge, and all were excited and enthusiastic and willing to support each other and develop the swimmers.

We hold County Schools Championships each year, in the Secondary gala the Best Boy was won by Akaash Das who broke 2 records in the event (100m Free & 100m Backstroke) and the Best Girl was Millie Wells who also broke a record in 100M Backstroke.

Para events were included in the ESSA Inter Divisional Championships this year and Akaash Das was subsequently selected to represent England at the ISF Under 15 Games in Rio De Janeiro and placed top in his age group.

During the 2022/23 season, Shropshire ASA's desire to positively support para-swimming continued to show results: encouraging its

embedding into mainstream club & competition environments, placing athletes onto National and International teams, and

generating impressive performance improvements – including medals to World level.

March 2023: all 7 para (6 x Oswestry Otters and 1 x Shrewsbury SC) athletes from Shropshire County participated in the Midlands Para training at Rugby along with Nicola Bainbridge as one of the Midlands Para Coaches for 2023.

During the year, athletes also variously took part in (amongst other events) the South East Masters Relays (DSS-GB Squad), West Midlands Summer Championships (Coventry) and West Midlands

Regional Open Water Championships, Downs Swimming European Champs in Italy and World Downs Championships in Portugal.

Although the number of para-swimmers is small, their impact at all levels is fantastic to see, and we encourage all County clubs to consider how they might help increase para outreach and

<u>Warwickshire County Talent Development Pathway</u> (<u>age-group swimming</u>)

The County Development Pathway group in Warwickshire who began their journey in 2022 continued in early 2023 with an online half-day of learning, followed by a second day in the pool and gym during the Summer. The program was well-received by all and has inspired many of our then 11- and 12-year-old swimmers to achieve great things throughout the year. Head Pathway Coach Kim Mortimer (Stratford Sharks) created a fantastic programme that the swimmers really benefited from.

Following considerable thought, the team came up with a great solution for the younger swimmers and invested in a half-day Pre-Pathway Development session at the Alan Higgs Centre, led by Sarah Collings-Hands (Nuneaton & Bedworth), which was a great introduction to the programme and very well-received.

We then launched our new County Development Pathway Programme for 2023/24 in November, also held at the Alan Higgs Centre. This was led by Head Pathway Coach Mark Mooney (Blythe Barracudas) with support from both Sarah Collings-Hands and Sam Fairchild (City of Coventry). Although many of the swimmers involved were also attendees at the previous year's events, we did see some new faces, and the newly-shaped programme was a big hit with multiple opportunities for learning and development. Adrian Ting from the University of Birmingham Team was awarded the Bronze for Youth Champion, Hannah Secher from Rugby received Silver for Artistic Swimming Coach of the Year, and Mike Beard (Solihull) and Ellie Simmonds (Boldmere) were inducted into the Swim England Hall of Fame!

In addition, Elaine Gale (Boldmere) was awarded the Volunteer of the Year Bronze medal. This prestigious award recognizes her exceptional contributions and dedication to volunteering in the field of swimming. Elaine's hard work, passion, and commitment to the sport have made a significant impact on the swimming community, and she is a true inspiration to all who know her. We are extremely fortunate to have Elaine on the Management Team at WASA, and to benefit from her experience and expertise as our County Welfare Officer.

'Release the Bear'

The Bear and Ragged Staff has been the emblem of the historic County of Warwickshire for hundreds of years, and Warwickshire ASA has been proud to adopt it as our logo. However, times change. And fresh attitudes come to the fore. Following the intervention of our young Development Pathway swimmers, the Executive has agreed to unchain and 'release the bear'.

Some may regard this as a trivial move. However, it is an important statement for our revised attitudes towards animal welfare. The initiative is still ongoing but as we progress towards adopting a new logo, we want to emphasise that WASA:

·values the opinions of all our young swimmers, and ·wants to reflect more modern attitudes towards animal cruelty - not often associated with swimming – but so important to the modern society with whom Swim England works.

New approach to County Swimming Records

It is important for our County Swimming Records to be in-line with National Rankings maintained by Swim England. Disparities have caused confusion and disappointment that some achievements have not been recognised by the County. To address this, the County has agreed that the historic practice of insisting that records be applied for within 28 days of their achievement would be abandoned, as this was considered to be an arbitrary time limit – after all, a record is a record!

2024 will see a new approach to County Records being achieved, one which we continue to discuss and evolve as we aim to celebrate the tremendous successes of athletes across Warwickshire.

County Championships 2023

County championships were held for all three active disciplines. These were successful, well attended, and enjoyed by all.

Warwickshire Exec Committee

Worcester County ASA

Worcester County started 2023 with the usual County Championships, held at both Perdiswell Pool in Worcester and Wolverhampton Central Baths. This year we had a large number of entrants, which still enabled us to produce a highly competitive championships, also confirming 'back to normal' following Covid. Excellent swims producing exciting finals helped provide the usual successful event. We were grateful for all volunteers who worked so hard to produce these Championships, both before and on race days, as finding volunteers is becoming harder year on year.

Swimming Secretary Report.

Inter County Events

The Annual 3 Counties Gala hosted by ourselves this year was held at Wolverhampton as Sandwell was still not open. The County were keen to regain the Trophy we had lost to Gloucestershire the year before. This we did by a considerable margin and all participating thoroughly enjoyed the occasion. Each County, Worcestershire, Staffordshire and Gloucester field 2 teams which gives the opportunity to those not quite up to the 1st team standard a chance to swim for their County.

The next major event was the National County Team Championships held each year at the beginning of October in Sheffield at Ponds Forge Pool. Having been promoted to Divisions 1 previously and finishing in 13th place in 2022 we were keen to see if that could be bettered in 2023. Well,it was by just one place to 12th. This is a tremendous achievement for a small County who only have just 13 clubs from which to choose our team compared to Yorkshire, who won, who have 77 clubs! This event is the highlight of the year for our swimmers who enjoyed the weekend away, all behaved impeccably.



Masters

This year we sent a large team to Derby for the Inter County event. A considerable number had only been training for a few weeks but were keen to participate. We achieved top 3 positions in 22 races which was an excellent result. Our Masters section is increasing considerably and we hope they will continue to improve during this next year to become a 'tour de force' at the next event.

Paul Wilkes from Redditch came 2nd in the 200 Fly event at the Masters World Championship in Doha recently. He broke the British records for this event and also for the 100 Fly where he came 5th. A tremendous achievement attained on his 40th Birthday, many congratulations to Paul from everyone in Worcester County.



Water Polo

Sandwell Pool finally opening has put the region on the British water polo map and will host the "Super Fives" in March 2024. We also congratulate Toby Chilcott from Worcester Crocodiles club who will represent Great Britain at U17 level in the European Championships.

Our Teams also competed well with Worcester Crocodiles Ladies winning the Midland league for the first time. Sandwell Aquatics Men finishing runners up in Division One of the Men's League. In terms of representations at West Midland Level we have 7 from Sandwell and 4 from Worcester Crocodiles.

Para Swimming

One of our Para Swimmers is Rebecca Redfern from Worcester S.C. who this year at the World Para Swimming Championships held in Manchester regained the Title she last won in London 2019 in the S13 category 100m Breaststroke beating her long time American rival. Becky is a wonderful ambassador for swimming and an excellent role model for her club and County demonstrating her commitment, hard work and sacrifice.



County Clubs


This year one of our clubs became Regional "Club of the Year" congratulations go to Redditch Swimming Club who also achieved their 125year Anniversary.

FINANCE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2023

The loss that the Region incurred last year was £40.1k which reduced its general reserves from £220.8k down to £160.7k. Reserves ring-fenced for development decreased from £79.6k to £73.2k so reserves in total reduced from £280.4k to £233.9k

The main reason for the loss is the increase in Staff costs due to the additional member that was appointed in August 2022 which continued throughout the year in 2023 plus the increase in hours from part time to full time of another staff member due to the increased workload within the Region.

Development activity was reasonably steady in 2023 following the upturn in 2022 post pandemic.

Turning to the Balance Sheet, note that we opened two further new current accounts with Lloyds during the year in the name of the new limited company, one to cover the Swimming Championships and one the Water Polo transactions with the intention to close the old Nat West Accounts for these items. This enables income and expenditure to be kept separate for those items. The old NatWest account for Swimming Champs is in the process of being closed whilst the old Water Polo account is being transferred for use as Inter Regional Water Polo.

Looking forward, we will almost certainly make another loss in 2024 due to agreement to take on a further part time staff member splitting the roles of Club Development and Administration into two separate roles following the promotion Amanda Swan into the role of Operations Manager during 2023. However new streams of funding have been sought to bolster the Championships with the intention to produce a good surplus to help cover the increased costs. We have also increased our memberships slightly in 2024 after several years of them remaining the same. Budgets for 2024 have been scrutinised carefully and the Development funding streams have currently been frozen to allow a full review of the system and a new approach for supporting our clubs be established which is less complicated than the previous system.
